Hearing God Above the Static

As kids, many of us played a version of the game "telephone line" where you repeated a phrase to the person beside you and so on down the line until the final person repeated what they thought they heard. Inevitably, what the last person heard was often far different from what the original person had stated. Listening and hearing with clarity requires that we tune out all the other noises and voices.

Several things may impede our ability to hear clearly. Turn up the volume! We often hear that expression when listening is difficult because of outside noise. Sometimes that noise is rooted in struggles and challenges we are facing that make it hard to hear God's voice. Perhaps it is an unconfessed sin in our heart or an unforgiving spirit towards others that diminish our ability to hear God's voice. Other times we may be listening to different voices that direct our focus to ourselves rather than those around us.

Hearing God's voice begins with our relationship with Him. We were created for relationship, and He invites us to communicate with

Him and to listen to His voice. The psalmist wrote, "In my distress, I called upon the Lord; to my God, I cried for help. From His temple He heard my voice and my cry to Him reached His ears" (Ps. 18:6). God is always attuned to the cry of His children. But do we hear His voice when He calls out to us?

Within the AGC family of churches, eleven distinct language group congregations preach, teach, and worship in their unique language. God speaks to all His children uniquely through His Word and His people. Sometimes, though, we develop a hearing impairment as

the noise around us increases, making it difficult to hear God's voice. We need to turn up the volume so that we hear His voice above the static.

In this edition of CONNECT, you will read stories of how God speaks to others within our Association above the world's noise. So be encouraged; listen for His voice!



Incredible, and Yet, Hard

It is very difficult to watch our children suffer. Interacting with Alex and Amber's story gives a whole new perspective on how we hear from God through the valley of suffering.

Our firstborn, Leonardo, arrived on January 15th, 2023. He was born with Pierre-Robin Sequence. The initial days were challenging as Amber recovered from surgery and our visas would soon expire as we had planned on being back in Mexico to follow God's call to mission.

Initially, Leo had to be on his belly to breathe and was fed through a feeding tube. The wait seemed endless as we anticipated seeing specialists. Yet, we



were thankful for the prayers and love we received. It was a beautiful testimony to the Lord's faithfulness and loving kindness! We held to the truth that God was in control, trusting in His plan.

While reading a devotional from Martyn Lloyd-Jones, this struck me: "Oh God grant us that we may all be filled with the Holy Spirit, and may we "know Him, and the power of His resurrection, and the fellowship of His sufferings, being made conformable unto His death." (Phil. 3:10); that we may know what He has done in us." The power of His resurrection and the fellowship of His sufferings - what an incredible and yet hard privilege.

And then the hard became harder. Leo continued to decline. What could a parent do but plead with God for a miracle? Yet, in and through it all God's love was shared in the hard places. Amber shared the Gospel with a mother in the NICU and we met other believers in the hospital and had fellowship with them.

AND THEN it happened! ... Amber went to the hospital expecting the worst, but when she walked in, Leo was laying on his back. She was quite upset as this could kill him, but the doctors said "we can't explain what happened. It's as if Leo decided that he is ok to be on his back, his oxygen levels are at 100%!" It is a miracle! We praise God for His healing and incredible mercy for our boy. The medical team brought a cleft palate bottle for Leo to drink from and he is doing well!

We are thankful that God heard the prayers of His people and is healing our boy! We are so blessed and thank God for how He has used this trial/valley to deepen our faith and help us better understand what it means to trust! It has been quite a journey, but we take comfort in the fact that our circumstances don't change who God is, rather God is the one who changes our circumstances. If God is teaching us something, it is to trust and rely on His sovereignty.

The BIG Move

I am big on calling: I want to be where God wants me to be, doing what He wants me to do when He wants me to do it.

The Apostle Paul lived in a similar way. Following the Spirit's guidance, he started churches in cities where numerous people began to follow Jesus. He preached in Athens where only a handful of people were converted and did not go on to Asia but finally went to Jerusalem knowing he would be captured. His dependence was on guidance from the Holy Spirit.

In 2021 my family moved from our home country in South Africa to Canada to pastor Grace Church in Newmarket, ON. This was a BIG move for which I needed to hear from God very clearly. Covid lockdowns probably helped, as it slowed me down enough to hear God's voice above the noise of the normal day-to-day busyness. But, with BIG choices like moving my family across the ocean, I also follow a recipe to discern God's guidance - not because I don't trust Him, but because I don't want to fall back on my preferences when decisions are hard. When I sense the Holy Spirit moving in my life, I ask God for confirmation:

- · from the Bible
- · from my wife
- from a Christian stranger who does not know my thoughts and is therefore without prejudice
- in the form of either a growing certainty or a sign that I cannot miss
- in the form of open doors

God has so much grace and has provided clear direction in these ways throughout my life. May you trust God enough to find a way that you can discern His guidance above the noise of your own busyness.

Listening in the Lament

Sometimes it is difficult to grasp what God is saying when our souls are in turmoil and our bodies are marred by disease or serious injury. These realities interrupt our lives, and our emotional and spiritual equilibrium is knocked off balance. We wonder, we fear, and we search for hope and answers. We long to hear God speak words that breathe life and offer perspective amid profound uncertainty.

This was the experience for my wife Peggi and me. The uncertainty came in the form of a cancer diagnosis for Peg and a serious leg injury for me. Yet, we heard God speak words of life and hope. Months of enforced solitude and relative quietness afforded times of unhurried reading and reflection. Relative inactivity allowed for stillness, not a desired solitude, yet real nonetheless! Crucial to hearing from God was our need to be honest with Him. We needed God to hear our confusion, fears, longings, and laments. Often, the Psalms became our 'voice' to God. The ancient laments turned modern, and God's Spirit spoke words of 'life and light' through His Word. Did we hear with clarity a word from God each day? No. Some days the pain was so intense that we just gutted out the day, and when we couldn't discern God's voice, we believed that God was good and at work even in the hard.

Not only did our gracious God speak above and through the 'noise', but He also caressed our souls through the actions and touch of His people. People who showed up and simply listened, reminding us of truths we needed to feed on, praying for us when we just didn't have the energy to pray.

Our experience continues to shape, refine and prepare us to deepen our walk with God, helping us step away from the busyness and noise to hear clearly and speak honestly with Him. This crucible experience enables us to draw near to others in their hard realities as we seek to be 'the voice and touch of God' to them.

We learn from Jesus and are grateful for His example to "come aside" and spend time with the Father. Being thankful allows us to hear God in the praises of His people, like in the stories that have been shared in this edition of Connect Magazine. We give glory to God as we listen to Him above the static.
